Synopsis

By marrying, the composer Tchaikovsky tried 'to redeem his soul from the moral sufferings that have so plagued him throughout recent years' – as his brother Modest acknowledged. This was a euphemistic reference to the homosexuality of both brothers, which they had admitted to each other at this time. The composer's marriage was a fiasco, but a brief one from which he fled in desperation. At the same time, he began an intense, long-distance friendship with an older woman who became his patron. Tchaikovsky saw his salvation in music: 'One could lose one's senses if music didn't exist. It's the most beautiful gift of heaven for a man who errs in the darkness... it is worth living for music's sake!' His life was cut short in 1893 when he drank a glass of water infected by cholera – supposedly a conscious act.

Act I

The soldier Gherman is unhappy; he has fallen in love with a wealthy girl, and is too poor to court her. His mood worsens when he sees the girl, Liza, and learns that she is engaged to his friend Prince Yeletsky. Count Tomsky tells Gherman about Liza's grandmother the Countess, who, many years previously, learnt a 'three-card' formula that enabled her to win spectacularly at the gambling tables. Gherman vows he will learn this secret to win Liza from Yeletsky.

Liza's friends entertain her with singing and dancing. When they leave, Liza wonders why she is so sad, and broods on the mysterious man she has seen watching her. It is Gherman, who now arrives to tell Liza that he loves her. At first she is hesitant, but finally admits that she loves him too.

Act II

Scene 1

At a ball, Yeletsky tells Liza how much he cares for her. Meanwhile Tomsky and others tease Gherman about his obsession with cards. Paulina and her friends stage a play about two young lovers. When it ends, Liza gives Gherman the key to the Countess's room, which will allow him access to Liza's own apartment; she hopes to meet him there the next day. The crowd hail the arrival of the Empress Catherine the Great.

Interval

Act II

Scene 2

Gherman hides in the Countess's room. When she returns to prepare for bed, he confronts her and begs to know the secret of the three cards. When Gherman pulls out his pistol the Countess dies of fright. Liza arrives and is horrified by what she sees.

Act III

After the Countess's funeral, Gherman obsessively recalls her appearance in her coffin, and how he thought her corpse winked at him. Gherman hallucinates that he can see the ghost of the Countess. She tells him the secret of the three cards –Three, Seven, Ace –and commands him to marry Liza. Gherman and Liza meet. They are briefly reconciled, but Gherman's obsession with the three cards terrifies Liza. When he rushes off to the gambling house, Liza commits suicide. Gamblers gather, including Yeletsky, unhappy at his broken engagement, and Tomsky. Gherman arrives. He plays the first two secret cards and wins huge sums of money. But when Yeletsky challenges him to a third game, the card Gherman receives is not the expected Ace, but the Queen of Spades. Gherman imagines that he sees the ghost of the Countess again, and commits suicide. As he dies, he sees a vision of Liza as a consoling angel. The men pray for him.
