
TIMINGS FOR EVENING PERFORMANCES

FROM 12.00PM

The Royal Opera House is open from 12.00pm every day. You can arrive any time.




AT 6.30PM

The door to the auditorium (the space where you take your seats to watch the show) will open at 6.30pm.




BEFORE 6.45PM

Please take your seats by 6.45pm so you are ready to watch the performance.




AT 7.00PM


At 7.00pm the show will begin. It will take about 1 hour and 15 minutes.



8.15PM — 8.20PM
The show will then end and people will clap while the performers take a bow. You can clap if you want to.



AT 8.20PM The show will finish around 8.20pm.




TIMINGS FOR AFTERNOON PERFORMANCES


FROM 12.00PM

The Royal Opera House is open from 12.00pm every day. You can arrive any time.




AT 1.30PM

The door to the auditorium (the space where you take your seats to watch the show) will open at 1.30pm.




BEFORE 1.45PM

Please take your seats by 1.45pm so you are ready to watch the performance.




AT 2.00PM

At 2.00pm the show will begin. It will take about 1 hour and 15 minutes.




3.15PM - 3.20PM

The show will then end and people will clap while the performers take a bow. You can clap if you want to.



AT 3.20PM

The show will finish around 3.20pm.




WATCHING THE SHOW

You can use your mobile or tablet, but it must be on silent. You cannot take pictures or videos of the performance.





You can wear your ear defenders. You can play with toys and hold a comfort toy.



The doors will stay open so if you would like to take a break, you can leave the auditorium and you can come back at any time.

ABOUT THE SHOW

The name of the show is *Wolf Witch Giant Fairy*. It is an opera. The singers tell the story with music and acting.




It is a make-believe story.
It is not a true story, and the performers are just pretending. You can find out what happens in the story by looking at the Visual Story.



TRAVELLING TO THE ROYAL OPERA HOUSE

Wolf Witch Giant Fairy is performed at the Royal Opera House in London, which is a theatre.

It is a large building with big glass windows.



The closest underground station is Covent Garden station.





AROUND THE THEATRE

The theatre is in a very busy area of London. When you arrive, there will be lots of people on the streets and cars, buses, and taxis on the road. It might be quite noisy.



ENTERING THE THEATRE

There are two ways to enter the Royal Opera House. The Bow Street Entrance is large with glass doors. There are no steps. It looks like this:



The Piazza entrance is in Covent Garden and is a small revolving door in the corner. This entrance is wheelchair accessible and there are no steps. It looks like this:




There will be a member of staff to assist. They will be wearing this uniform:

There will also be volunteers that can help with whatever you need. They will be wearing red t-shirts:



You may have to wait in a queue to get into the theatre.



Someone who works for the theatre will ask to check inside your bags.



Then a different person who works for the theatre will ask for your ticket. You only need to show your ticket when to sit in your seat in the theatre, you can show on your phone or a paper ticket.



Inside the theatre there is an area called the foyer. It might be very busy and loud.



SITTING IN THE THEATRE

FINDING YOUR SEATS

Where you are sitting will be written on your ticket. A member of the Front of House team can help you find your seat and show you where the toilets are.

There will be other people sitting around you. If you are sitting in the middle of a row you might have to pass people to get to your seat.





WHEELCHAIR SPACES There are six wheelchair spaces in the Linbury Theatre. Lift access is only to seats on the right-hand side of the auditorium.



SITTING IN THE STALLS The stalls is the name for the seats on the same level as the stage. You will take steps down to get to your seat. There is a wheelchair lift.



SITTING IN CIRCLE

The circle is the name for the seats one level above the stage. You may need to take some steps up and down depending on where your seat is.



The upper circle is the name for the seats one level above the circle. You may need to take some steps up and down depending on your seat.





INSIDE THE AUDITORIUM

You will take your seats in the theatre auditorium. It looks like this and has about 400 seats. Not all the seats will be filled, but there will be other people watching the show with you.



You can buy a drink or snack at one of the theatre bars and take it to your seat.



You can buy ice cream in the interval. You can also bring your own cold snacks. You can eat your cold snacks in your seat.



You can also buy a programme. In the programme you can read about the show and the performers.



TOILETS

There are toilets on every level. Look for these signs.



Accessible toilets are located on all floors of the theatre. Please ask a member of staff to help.



DURING THE SHOW

The doors will stay open so if you would like to take a break, you can leave the auditorium and you can come back at any time.

If you need to take some time out from the auditorium, you can visit a chill out space. You can ask a member of staff to take you there. There is one in the Linbury Theatre Foyer. Follow signs for the Taylor Learning Rooms.



If you need to take a break from the auditorium but still want to watch the show, you can watch it on a TV screen in the Linbury Theatre Foyer.

If you would like to keep watching the show but need to change seats or be further away, please let an usher know.



You might see people in the audience clapping and dancing during the show. When performers bow at the end of a song, and at the end of the first half of the show, some people will clap. You don't have to clap if you don't want to.



When the show has finished, the front of house team will show you the way out of the theatre.

It might be crowded and noisy as everyone leaves to go home.




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
